THE BEAUTY OF GOOD FRIDAY



Some of the most beautiful things in the world have an ugly side. What about the emperor penguin chick, nestling in a feathery pouch above its parent's feet? There's a lovely moment when mum and dad greet each other

over the gaping beak of their fuzz-ball offspring. Heads bent together, making a heart shape in the air, we can't help seeing a reflection of our own ideals of love in the pair.

But the reality of what those birds are going through is even more gruelling than human parenthood. Father penguin has spent all winter sheltering the egg from freezing hurricane-force winds, while mother penguin was feeding at sea. When the chick hatched its parents started an exhausting game of tag, taking it in turns to walk across the ice and risk being eaten by leopard seals or killer whales in order to catch fish for their new offspring.

The living world is truly wonderful in so many ways, but the darker side of the picture is never far away. Creation is groaning (Romans 8:22), and waiting to be rescued. Enter Jesus, through whom all of creation was made. The king of the universe came to live with us, bringing His great love and wisdom to the human population of first-century Israel. The Creator was relating to His creation in a very personal way, and this could have been a totally beautiful picture.

But there is a horrifically ugly side of Jesus' story that threatens to obscure the beauty of what He did on Good Friday. It was a brutal and terrifying day when human sinfulness resulted in the Son of God being executed by His enemies, but thankfully there was much more to it than that. The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ set off a seismic wave of spiritual events whose effects are still rippling out across the world. So that ugly day nearly 2,000 years ago is called 'good' because of what it achieved. Those who follow Jesus find their lives are changed for the better, even if their day-to-day existence may still be incredibly tough. When people come to understand what creation is for and who it belongs to, they can begin to serve and preserve the earth as they should. These things are only whispers of what is to come, but they give me hope for the future redemption of all Creation. I can choose to dwell on the beauty of Jesus' death because it was not the end of the story - the future beckons.

THE PASSION OF JESUS IN TRAFALGAR SQUARE



On Good Friday 20,000 people encompassing all faiths will gather to watch the Easter story in Trafalgar Square in central London.

The biblical story is spectacularly brought to life at the annual performance of 'The Passion of Jesus' returning for the tenth this year. Witness moving performance from the Wintershall Players, which commemorates the day arrested, tried Jesus was and

crucified. A cast of more than 100 actors and volunteers dressed in splendid costumes, as well as horses, donkeys and doves, come together to create an authentic scene in the famous square.

There are two 90-minute live performances at 12pm and 3.15pm, which are projected on to big screens so everyone in the Square can follow the action. The productions are completely free of charge – a gift to Londoners and visitors. No tickets are required

At Easter our thoughts are drawn to the death and resurrection of Jesus. These events are central to our faith, but sometimes we can over-complicate their meaning. The heart of it, though, remains very simple:

Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, and on the third day was raised to life (1Corinthians 15 verse 3).

HE DIED TO SHOW HIS LOVE FOR YOU. He gave his life as a demonstration or proof of the love He has for each one of us, no matter who we are or what we have done. He was motivated to lay down His life for us, not out of duty or obligation, but compassionate love. 'While we were still sinners, Christ died for us' Romans 5 verse 8

HE DIED TO SET YOU FREE. Sin has entangled every one of us. We are under it's power and unable ourselves to loosen its grip. At the cross Jesus dealt with sin once and for all by dying in our place. Now, when we turn to Him for help, we can be released from the hold it has on us and find complete forgiveness.

HE DIED TO BRING YOU HOME. The Cross makes it possible for us to be reconciled to God. Like the prodigal son we were once far away from God, but now because we have been forgiven, we can return to our true home in God. A welcome awaits us, and a joyfilled reunion is possible.

I remember vividly a simple poster I saw on the notice board of our local Methodist Chapel. It had a silhouette of three crosses on a hill, and underneath the words, 'FOR YOU'. Nothing fancy or clever, but a clear presentation of the Easter message, and it struck me deeply.

This Easter, why not think about these two simple words:

FOR YOU!

TRIBUTE TO JOHN SHUTTLEWORTH

Our dear friend John passed away peacefully on 6th March aged 97.

His health had been failing over the last 6 months mainly due to a defective swallow which meant that food could often pass towards his lungs. Consequently his food had to be pureed. If you had known John for any length of time you would know that food was a major pleasure for him and he found that there was little

pleasure in the pulped meals. He therefore continued to lose weight until in the last week of his life he could take only water and that in small sips.

John's most recent admission to hospital was difficult and he was very relieved to be discharged in mid February. He was very well cared for in those last days at the home of Richard, his long term partner in Meridian Records, with wonderful support from the health service.

John was born on 20th October 1921. He had a twin brother who died a number of years ago. He was a confirmed bachelor.

He went to Bristol University but his studies were cut short by military service in the Navy which took him round the world. When his service was ended he returned to University to complete his degree.

Having graduated he held various teaching posts as a specialist maths teacher and finished his teaching career with Eltham College where he taught from 1961 to 1982. I understand that under his tutelage most of his maths students achieved exceptional results, many finishing up with Oxbridge places.

In 1975 during his time at Eltham John started a recording business (what teacher today could start a business whilst still holding a full time teaching post?). Then, after retirement from Eltham College more time was given to Meridian Records which grew to the extent John needed to recruit help. Even though Richard, had none of the attributes that John asked for he interviewed him, took him on and trained him. Richard now has an international reputation which had previously been John's. Meridian rarely uses a studio and specialises in recording in natural environments.

John was a long standing member of Mottingham Methodist Church and would usually be found on Sunday hiding behind the screen providing the music through the machine which he generously sourced for the church.

I got to know John well over the last few years of his life and found him to be a caring and generous friend which was a surprise because John often failed to show that side of his nature. Shopping for him was a challenge, because he made it so, as he seemed to make it his role to beat the system. A trip to the shops might mean that some things needed to come from LIDL's, some from Iceland and others from Sainsbury's (provided it was their "basics" brand). It was fun. We had good times together and enjoyed doing the "i" crossword puzzle each day. I shall miss him.

How passion flowers got their name

Why is the passion flower known as the passion flower? This beautiful climbing plant that grows in many of our gardens is not native to the UK, but comes from South America. It was first discovered by Spanish missionaries working there, centuries ago. Drawings were sent back to Europe, and in 1609 an Italian priest interpreted the flower to represent the crucifixion, otherwise known as the Passion.

He decided that the five petals and five sepals could represent the ten disciples who remained steadfast (Judas and Peter both abandoned Jesus). The corona could be seen as Jesus' crown of thorns. The stigma could be seen as the cross or nails, and the five stamens could be seen as the number of wounds Jesus received.
